






Boards & Commissions Recruitment Fair. Are you looking for a way to get involved in your city, but don’t know where to start?

If so, you can begin by attending the city of Glendale’s Advisory Boards and Commissions Recruitment Fair from 6 – 8 p.m. Tuesday, April 29 at the Glendale Civic Center Annex, 5750 W. Glenn Drive.

The city’s 18 citizen advisory groups serve an integral role in helping shape the community, from local historic preservation initiatives to transportation projects. Residents attending the recruitment fair will have the opportunity to learn more about each board and commission, as well as speak with city representatives.

High school students living in Glendale can also get involved by applying to serve on either the city’s Library Advisory Board or Parks & Recreation Advisory Commission.

The time commitment to serve on an advisory board varies, but most meet at least once a month for several hours. Preparation for meetings and special meetings sometimes require an additional time commitment. Membership is usually for two years. A three-hour basic training program is required for residents who have completed an application to serve on a board or commission.
