Children Gain Court System Knowledge at Law Day. Seventh and eighth-graders from Our Lady of Perpetual Help will have an opportunity to learn about the court system on Wednesday May 1 from 9 a.m. to noon as Glendale City Court recognizes National Law day. The theme for this year's annual event is "Realizing the Dream." This is an opportunity for City Court to share with students how the law relates to their freedom and rights. These students will learn from a variety of professionals with diverse backgrounds involved in the legal systems including a city prosecutor, a police sergeant, public defender and judge. The professionals will discuss the justice system and how it works from their perspective. Glendale City Court recognizes Law Day each year by inviting a group of local students to participate in activities and lesson plans while hearing from a variety of justice professionals.

West Phoenix/Central Glendale Transit Study. Valley Metro will hold a public meeting on Monday May 6 from 6-8 p.m. at the Glendale Civic Center, 5750 W. Glenn Drive, to kick-off the West Phoenix / Central Glendale Corridor Alternatives Analysis. The Alternatives Analysis is a study of options for providing enhanced transit service to the West Phoenix/ Central Glendale area. The study area is defined as: 19th Avenue on the east, the Loop 101 to the west, Northern Avenue to the north and south to Camelback Road. Valley Metro will provide an overview about the project, the proposed project schedule, and an opportunity for questions and comments. City Volunteers Save Glendale Millions of Dollars. Volunteers donated more than 113,000 hours to the city of Glendale through a variety of methods and services in 2012, creating an economic value of more than \$2.3 million. This dollar figure is equal to the amount it would cost if the city had to pay for the volunteers' services. Elected officials and city leaders honored Glendale's volunteers at the 18th annual volunteer recognition event held on Wednesday April 17. Volunteers provide a variety of services with the city including re-shelving books at the libraries; answering phone calls and distributing visitors packets at the Glendale Visitor's Center; giving tours and fixing electronics at the Glendale Adult Center; cleaning up parks and trails; painting homes and cleaning up neighborhoods; assisting fire and police with intervention to victims, families and witnesses during emergency situations; assisting recycling efforts during special events and providing upkeep and care to the xeriscape demonstration garden. Fire Department to Host Community Emergency Response Team Training. The Glendale Fire Department will be hosting a 21-Hour Basic Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training program beginning on Friday May 31 at 6 p.m. All classes will be held at the Glendale Regional Public Safety Training Center (GRPSTC), located at 11550 W. Glendale Ave. Anyone from Glendale or the surrounding area age 18 and above will be eligible to attend the training program. The class will take up to 25 participants on a first-come-first-served basis. The basic CERT curriculum will consist of Disaster Preparedness, Fire Safety, Medical Operations, Search and Rescue, and Terrorism as well as hands-on training and simulations.
