The Glendale Police Department Participates in the Domestic Violence Warrant Round-Up.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, which provides the Glendale Police Department the opportunity to educate the community, emphasize that domestic violence is a crime, warn abusers that they will be prosecuted and offer victims aid and support.

The Domestic Violence Warrant Round-Up culminates National Domestic Violence Awareness Month in October. The round-up is a two and a half day event where Family Violence Detectives lead teams of officers and members of Adult Probation to pursue domestic violence offenders who have been issued warrants for their arrest. This year, over 80 police and probation personnel were involved in the operation. A collaborative effort of Glendale police detention staff, the Glendale City Court and Glendale City Prosecutor's Office provided special jail courts for the influx of new arrestees.

The purpose of the event is to raise domestic violence awareness and to hold domestic violence offenders accountable. This year was the most successful Domestic Violence Warrant Round Up ever for the Glendale Police Department. A total of 37 arrests were made and 68 warrants were cleared as a result of the operation.

The Glendale Police Department would like to remind the public that the [Glendale Family Advocacy Center](#) offers numerous resources for victims of family crimes. It is important that victims of domestic violence realize they have choices.

Unattended Candle Responsible for Glendale House Fire. Glendale Fire Investigators say a townhouse fire on the morning of October 28th was caused by a candle left unattended when the occupants went to bed. The Glendale Fire Department reminds everyone to use extra care when using candles.

FACTS

- In 2010, there were approximately 9,600 U.S. home fires started by candles. Of those 9,600 fires, 90 people died and 820 were injured.
- Candle fires cause \$370 million in direct property damage.
- 36% of home candle fires start in the bedroom
- 55% of candle fires were from a combustible material placed too close to the candle.
- 12% of candle fires started after the user fell asleep.

SAFETY TIPS

- Extinguish all candles when leaving a room or going to sleep.
- Keep candles away from items that can burn such as curtains, clothing and paper.
- Use sturdy candleholders that won't tip over and are large enough to collect dripping wax.
- Place candles in areas where children and pets cannot get near them or tip them over.
- Keep candles away from flammable liquids.
- Trim wicks to one-quarter inch.
- Discard candles when wicks are within two inches of the holder.
- Store candles and matches out of a child's reach.
- Do not use a candle during a power outage, use a flashlight.
