COUNCILMEMBERS APPOINTED TO SERVE ON NATIONAL COMMITTEES


GLENDALE, Ariz. – Councilmembers Joyce Clark and Phil Lieberman have been reappointed to serve on policy and advocacy steering committees for the National League of Cities (NLC).

Clark, who represents the city's Yucca District, was reappointed to the Public Safety and Crime Prevention Committee. The committee is responsible for policy development in the areas of crime prevention, corrections, substance abuse, fire policy, juvenile justice, disaster preparedness and relief, homeland security, domestic terrorism, court systems and gun control.

Lieberman, who represents the Cactus District, was reappointed to serve on three NLC committees. He will begin his 10th term on the University Communities Council Steering Committee, which assists cities, state municipal leagues and the NLC in gathering, sharing and analyzing information about opportunities, issues and policies of interest to university communities.

He will also continue serving on the Human Development Steering Committee. The committee develops policies on employment and job training, early childhood development, temporary assistance to needy families, unemployment insurance, income support programs, immigration and refugee policy, health and education, equal opportunity and social services.
