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Learn about Haunted Places in Arizona from Real Ghost Hunters

GLENDALE, Ariz. – The 1984 film “Ghostbusters” took a comic look at poltergeists, setting up shop in an old firehouse and trapping pesky ghosts, spirits, haunts, and poltergeists for money. Bill Murray, Dan Aykroyd and Harold Ramis will always be linked in our imaginations as wisecracking ghost exterminators. But, they were not real.

Meet genuine paranormal investigators at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 24 in the Roadrunner Room at Foothills Branch Library, 19055 N. 57th Ave. The Arizona Desert Ghost Hunters will present “Arizona Ghosts and Hauntings.”

The team members – Debbie, Grace, Anne and Hank (no last names) – live in the Valley. They are all paranormal investigators and three of them are spirit photographers. They met by chance two years ago while exploring the Hotel Vendome in Prescott. Since then, the four investigators have pursued their beliefs in an afterlife and the desire to make a connection.

They use equipment dedicated to capturing images with infrared photography, electromagnetic sensors and both photo and digital cameras.

The team has traveled to various sites around the United States and throughout Arizona. They will be showing photos, playing recordings of sounds that the apparitions made, and discussing various sightings. They have captured apparitions on the courthouse steps in Prescott and in the back alley behind the Hotel Vendome. There is the apparition of a cowboy in a hat and duster on the outside wall of the OK Corral in Tombstone.

Even new homes can have ghosts. The owner of a home built in 2001 in Gilbert was experiencing some strange happenings—someone or something would sit at the foot of the bed or just watch the homeowner during the day. The team took a photo and through a tarot reading discovered that the apparition’s name began with a “K.” Further investigation proved that the home was built on top of an old homestead or family burial plot that had many years before belonged to a farmer named Kevin.

They have many more experiences to share.
