**GLENDALE, Ariz.** -- Join us this November as three local novelists – inspired by their diverse experiences as a helicopter pilot, a genealogical researcher, and a veterinarian – visit the Velma Teague Library, 7010 N 58<sup>th</sup> Ave.

Anne Wilson, author of “Hover,” will appear at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 7. Her career as a Naval Academy graduate and one of the first female Navy helicopter pilots is reflected in her story of the challenges faced by trailblazing Navy helicopter pilot Sara Denning. Next up, mystery authors Donis Casey and Eileen Brady will make a joint appearance at 6:30 p.m. on Thursday, Nov. 19, courtesy of their publisher, Poisoned Pen Press. In “All Men Fear Me,” the sixth mystery in Casey’s Alafair Tucker series, the U.S. has finally entered the First World War. Alafair finds herself caught in the middle when her socialist brother, her German son-in-law, and her wildly patriotic son clash, while murders at the local brick company add to the tension. Winner of the Arizona Book Award and a third-generation farm girl from Tulsa, Oklahoma, Donis Casey now lives with her husband in Tempe.
